Your Town Council has been busy refining the results of Ask Meltham in order to update its 4-year plan and ensure its priorities align with what you've been telling us. We have now identified seven priority areas. At our January meeting we agreed the budget for the year and in February our new Shopfront Improvement grant becomes live. We are determined to improve the look of the Town Centre this year with more flowers, litter picking and working with all the businesses and shop owners. 
## **Ask Meltham: Reducing Litter**

Walkers are Welcome in Meltham are planning a co-ordinated Litter Pick on Saturday 28th March supported by Meltham Town Council. We are looking for additional volunteers to come and join us. Please look at the Meltham Walkers are Welcome Facebook page for further details. The Litter Pick route proposed:

- 1. Town Gate Gardens (adjacent to Near Lane)
- 2. Near Lane
- 3. Steps and path leading to Morrisons
- 4. Path from Station Street to its intersection with The Cobbles
- 5. Continue to steps leading to Mean Lane
- 6. Continue to steps path leading to Hey Doorstep Green
- 7. Continue to steps path leading to Sunny Heys Road

We will be working with the supermarkets, other independent shops, Meltham Business Association, schools and Kirklees Council.

## **Dog Fouling Campaign**



As we reported in our last newsletter Meltham Town Council launched an innovative anti dog-fouling campaign, aimed at dog walkers who don't scoop the poop last year. The Council joined forces with environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy in a bid to reduce dog fouling in priority problem areas in Meltham. The campaign to tackle dog fouling hotspots involves the display of 'We're watching you' signs which use innovative cutting-edge materials so they are visible even after dark. Local residents in the first two priority areas have reported a marked reduction in dog fouling since the signs went up. As a result the Council will be expanding the scheme to other key areas.

Town Mayor, Councillor Kate Buchanan said, "Feedback from residents as part of the Ask Meltham project made it clear that dog fouling is an issue in Meltham that residents want addressed. The vast majority of dog owners are responsible people, who habitually pick up after their dog but some don't and we are thrilled to be working with Keep Britain Tidy on such a cutting-edge campaign. We are delighted with the initial feedback from residents on the impact the campaign is having in the first two priority areas and will roll out the campaign to other areas shortly."

Public areas in Kirklees also have Dog Control Public Space Protection Orders - if you don't clean up after your dog in these areas you can be issued with a fixed penalty notice, or prosecuted in the Magistrates' Court. You can report dog fouling to Kirklees Council using a simple online form available on their website. Remember that information about the dog owner(s) causing the problem, or the most common times that people walk their dogs, are helpful to Kirklees Council as it may allow them to take specific enforcement action.

## **Meltham Town Centre: Shopfront Grant Scheme**



Many residents commented during our 'Ask Meltham' conversation about how the Town Centre might be improved. Ideas included larger floral displays in the summer months, improvements to car parking and ways to reduce the traffic congestion. We have an attractive historic Town Centre with a number of fine buildings but it could be better. One action the Town Council has implemented is a new 'Shopfront grant scheme' which is now up and running. A grant of up to £2,500 is available to any retail property within the Conservation Area for improving the façade of their property. All proposals must follow good design principles and in particular taking note of the historic

nature of the centre. Other similar town and village centres elsewhere in the UK have similar schemes which have worked well in uplifting and smartening their appearance.

**The railings:** We have been told by Kirklees Council that due to the fact that they had to be manufactured to order, there has been an unavoidable delay in returning them to their former glory. We look forward to their return.

## **Broadlands Recreation Ground – Getting better**

A public consultation took place last autumn at Meltham's Sports and Community Centre to seek ways of improving Broadlands Recreation Ground, led by Kirklees Council. All the suggestions made have been considered and built into an exciting package of improvements. Phase 1 of the improvements will include: a major refurbishment of the ball court which will provide a competition standard 5 aside football, basketball and netball court, with a regular maintenance programme for the future; a new and extended play area with a wider range of play equipment to cater for all ages; resurfaced main paths; extra bins and picnic benches; and additional tree planting. The works are to be phased over the next year or so and are being funded from contributions from Barratt Homes in the form of a Section 106 contribution (these are conditions imposed on the developers to provide benefit to the community).

A further Phase 2 project is also on the horizon when additional Section 106 funds become available, with possible improvements in this phase including an extension to the play area, new pathways, a 'trim trail' with outdoor vandal-proof gym equipment, biodiversity improvements to make the site the site better for wildlife, and improved drainage and surfacing to the football and rugby pitches.





## Ask Meltham: Prioritising the Results

Our Ask Meltham discussions were exceptionally well supported with over 700 respondents yielding almost 120 potential improvement projects. We carried out an initial review of the projects in order to determine their relative priorities and then held a drop-in session where residents could vote for their top project from each of the 14 themes. We also sought feedback from children at Honley High who had previously been in Year 6 in the summer of 2019 when the Ask Meltham project took place.

We used an analysis tool called a Cause & Effect (C&E) Matrix, adapted from Six Sigma problem solving techniques. We selected four criteria to rate each possible project against then sorted the results with the highest scores at the top. Our criteria were:

- 1. A positive impact on Meltham
- 2. Ease of implementation
- 3. Cost
- 4. Feasibility

We put the feedback results and the C&E Matrix together. This resulted in 39 projects. After grouping projects with a common theme we have been able to form 7 major projects:

- 1. Improve Robert Ashton Memorial Park
- 2. Litter reduction
- 3. Improve Social Contact Opportunities
- 4. Improve Road Safety
- 5. Improve the Look of the Town Centre
- 6. A Greener Meltham
- 7. 3 stand-alone projects covering dog fouling, signage and improving social housing



## **Ask Meltham: Youth provision**

In November 2019, following the Ask Meltham conversations, the Town Council gave a grant to Enabling Youth to carry out a consultation with young people to find out what they want. Many young people said there were no safe places for them to meet and nothing for them to do in Meltham. However, one heartening statistic in the report was that 84% of young people are satisfied with Meltham as a place to live. When asked for suggestions, young people were not short of ideas: 'helping others', 'cycle routes', 'gaming groups', 'teen café'. We will be working with the team from Enabling Youth and Kirklees over the coming months.

The Enabling Youth Team had this message for the Town Council:

'I would like to say on behalf of the team, a big 'THANKYOU' for supporting us to carry out this consultation. Having conversations with over 200 young people has given us a real insight into how young people feel about their community, what activities they would like for their age group, and the kind of things that young people would like information and support around in their community.'
