Civic Sunday -Report from the Town Mayor Clr Roberta Bampton



Meltham in Focus: Heritage Open Day

Meltham Town Council (MTC) was delighted to contribute to the Heritage Open Days at the Carlile Institute on 11-12 September 2021. The theme was Edible England and the Carlile's contribution was entitled Sweet Memories, a wonderful exhibition created by Ann Jurzyczyn from Meltham residents' comments, memories and artefacts of sweets and sweet shops.

Two other exhibitions were on display at the Carlile on 12 September: Meltham in Focus and Small Worlds: Meltham in Lockdown, a photographic exhibition by Olivia Hemingway which had been part-funded by MTC

The collection of articles and photographs known as Meltham in Focus was digitised by MTC last summer and is now available to view online via the Council's website and Huddersfield Exposed. Unfortunately the planned live launch in the Summer of 2020 could not take place due to lockdown restrictions. For the occasion of the Heritage Open Days, MTC loaned a copy of the folders to the Carlile Institute plus a selection of photos which were enlarged and displayed in the Jubilee Room. The response was extremely positive and many people came by to view the exhibitions and enjoy a cup of tea.

Reducing Plastic Use at Christmas

Did you know that the majority of Christmas wrapping paper can't be recycled because of the plastic or foil content? The more expensive the paper is, the less likely it is that it can be recycled, you can test this by applying the scrunch test - scrunch a piece into a ball, if it stays scrunched up then it will most likely be recyclable but if it springs apart then unfortunately it can't be recycled. It is possible to buy both recyclable wrapping paper and environmentally friendly crackers, these are now available at many high street retailers as well as on the internet, or why not use brightly coloured pages from magazines to wrap up small gifts?

My name is Alice Barker. I'm 26 years old, a Meltham resident and have cerebral palsy and use a powered wheelchair.

If you've looked in the windows of the businesses on Huddersfield Road in the past few weeks, there's a chance you might have seen this poster (pictured right). It is part of Meltham's Mobility Mindful campaign which I started and I'd like to let you know a little bit more about what I'm trying to do. I'm an avid nature enthusiast and am a brand ambassador for the world-renowned N/a'an ku sê Foundation - a conservation organisation based in Namibia, Africa. Fortunately, I am lucky enough to have the beautiful Meltham countryside on my doorstep and nothing gives me greater pleasure than wandering around the village and surrounding hillside.On Tuesday, 27 July 2021 I

delivered Proud to be Mobility Mindful flyers to the main businesses and public locations in Meltham and shared them on social media. To my surprise, the response was overwhelmingly positive; all the



businesses agreed to put them up; the library asked if they could make photocopies and people were messaging me online asking if they could have one for their window. I was printing out flyers faster than I could keep up!

The Mobility Mindful campaign is now visible all over Meltham. Its intention is simply to make the residents of Meltham more 'mindful' of the difficulties disabled people face: making sure entryways and walkways are clear with enough room for a wheelchair to pass; being more considerate where and when you park and being accommodating to disabled people if they need help are all ways to make Meltham more Mobility Mindful.

I am looking forward to working with Meltham Town Council to continue to raise awareness about these issues. 




Road Safety Heroes: Our supporters

Wilshaw Village Hall Update from the Trustees

'We are pleased to report that we were successful with our application to the Common Good Trust for Grant Aid. They have pledged us a sum of £5,000. The Crossroads Centre has also given us a grant of £908.00 towards regeneration of the Hall. We have been busy with external and internal repairs and refurbishment

The original step and pedestrian gate have been salvaged and re-purposed which will make the former school yard safe for children as it will be fully enclosed. Stone flags have been laid to the front and side of the Hall, downpipes and gutters have been repaired, moss has been removed from the extension roof, stone mullions inside the Hall have been stripped and all walls in the main Hall have been stripped and replastered. The front door has been refurbished and coping stones and pinion have been re-seated. The emergency lighting has been brought up to current regulations.

All the above work has been done by volunteers apart from the electrical work'.



Robert Ashton Memorial Park (RAMP)

Plans to refurbish the Robert Ashton Memorial Park which is owned and managed by Meltham Town Council (MTC) are coming together with assistance from landscape architects and Kirklees Council. MTC appointed Kirklees officers to develop strategic plans to support the refurbishment of key areas of the park which followed on from feedback collated in a survey earlier this year. Once we have draft plans in place they will be published in the Mercury and online when we will once again be seeking your feedback.

A number of small pieces of work are being carried out in the park, for example the removal of fencing around the play area, further repairs to equipment and play surfaces following the annual inspection of the play equipment. Funding for the refurbishment works is coming from money received from contributions from developers linked to the recent housing developments in Meltham (section 106 contributions) combined with funds from MTC reserves. The initial phase of works is estimated to be around £250,000.
